Member Spotlight: Victor Labreche, CPT, MCIP, RPP

Langara College's Applied Planning Program

The Langara College Applied Planning Post-Degree Diploma Program prepares students for the competitive technical urban planning field with the practical skills involved with the planning process. The 1-year program started with an intensive one-week Introduction to Planning course where students learned basic planning principles and how they can be applied to the Metro Vancouver Region. The latter half of the course involved time outside the classroom with a SkyTrain/transportation tour as well as a tour around the City of Vancouver to experience the result of planning policies from a historic perspective. The Fall semester consisted of four full-time night classes taught by practicing professional planners. Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) was the fall semester's special topic.

The first semester's regular classes are Planning Process and Law, Planning Theory, Practice and Ethics, Planning Applications in GIS, and Introduction to Planning Methods. Planning Process and Law involved a detailed introduction to British Columbia's planning legislation and focussed on planning laws that are used by B.C. municipalities. The class assignments enhanced our understanding of Official Community Plans, preparing a zoning amendment bylaw, and understanding a board of variance brief and application process.

Planning Theory, Ethics and Practice explored major theories of planning and urban development in a seminar format

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where key ethics and value frameworks were discussed and debated with a particular focus on applied practice. Guest speakers allowed informative lectures focused on PIBC's Code of Ethics and Professional Conduct and the benefits of public spaces. Each student was assigned to present an ethical framework on a planning topic to the class, attend and document a city planning event, and critique any current development plan.

Planning Applications in GIS introduced the commonly used software ArcGIS 10.4 and ArcGIS Pro. This hands-on course allowed students to discover the software's abilities as well as understand how to display, analyze and manipulate GIS data and how to use it for different kinds of projects.

Introduction to Planning Methods outlined the basics of policy analysis and planning, including data collection, analysis of information for undertaking a range of planning tasks, and general aspects of problem solving. Planning surveys and analysis methods were reviewed to identify and understand some key planning issues through projects and covered land use surveys, census data analysis, and transportation development potential.

The Spring 2017 semester courses will include Land Development, Urban and Rural Planning, Social Planning and Community Development, Environmental Planning, and three Special Topics courses. As a cohort, we look forward to diversifying our technical portfolios and gaining more practical skills that go beyond introductory coursework.

George was a Planning Consultant for various municipalities and planning companies in Manitoba before moving West. He moved in to several technical and demanding roles in the private sector and sat at management level for almost fifteen years. George is a seasoned pro who will no doubt help to mould successful planners for years to come.

I would also like to thank Ben Misener, Manager of Land & Environment at Brazeau County, an Olds College graduate who has consistently supported the Rural Planning Major in his role as CACPT Alberta representative. Thank you to Kris Orsan, CACPT President, for hosting the students in Red Deer this year and giving the students an opportunity to meet industry professionals— it really was an invaluable experience.

TechTALK Article: "CACPT Red Deer Workshop: GIS – Emergency Fire Planning"



At the end of September, 2016, the CACPT Western Chapter hosted a full-day workshop discussing the recent fires in Fort McMurray and the assistance efforts that helped to battle the blaze. Planning Technicians played an important role in helping guide fire fighting and relief efforts during and after the worst of the fire.

The event was hosted at the Baymont Inn and Suites Conference Centre in the City of Red Deer, Alberta, with guest speakers including Alanna Young, a Planning Technician from the Sustainable Development Department in the City of Edmonton, as well as Wade Colwell, a Wildfire Technologist from the Forestry Division of Alberta Agriculture and Forestry. In addition to the guest speakers from industry, we were joined by and heard inspiring words from Kris Orsan, President of CACPT.

The event was well attended by industry and by Olds College students and faculty from the Environmental Stewardship & Rural Planning program.

Alanna Young kicked-of the presentations with a comprehensive review of the emergency efforts made by Edmonton's Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) from the initial reports of the effort. Alanna described the working conditions and hours involved with the effort, as well as describing tools used to help remotely assist efforts in Fort McMurray. It identified that one of the tools used was the aerial imagery and GIS software, Pictometry. Alanna gave a live example of how the software is utilized by Planning Technicians and Planners alike in the Sustainable Department at the City of Edmonton. My concluding thoughts of her presentation identified that although the media focused on the tremendous work done by firefighters from around the country, this work was greatly assisted by those working remotely to coordinate the effort.

Following the lunch break, which included a brief networking opportunity between students and industry, Wade Colwell from Alberta Agriculture and Forestry gave a very insightful presentation on the causes of forest fires, as fire mitigation practices and strategies.

Wade identified that the Province of Alberta has a "FireSmart" program that helps to live with and manage the dangers of forest fires. He described that there are considerations that homeowners in wildfire-prone areas need to address in order to proactively mitigate the dangers of wildfires. Such considerations include the size and type of trees and landscaping that shouldn't be within close proximity of a building. He made reference to the FireSmart Homeowner's Manual that can be used to design fire-smart homes.

Wade also described different tools and associated projects undertaken by Province of Alberta to help protect vulnerable communities and developments from wildfires. Such projects include vegetation management, which would result in the strategic removal of natural fire hazards adjacent to vulnerable communities. Other tools used to help mitigate risk would include policy and legislative changes to ensure particular types of development are not constructed within hazard areas. Wade gave a multitude of real-life experience examples of being in the field and helping to fight wildfires, which captured the audience and spurred an informative Q&A session.

The CACPT would like to sincerely thank Alanna and Wade for their inspiring presentations and wish them the best of luck with any future emergency response efforts.

The CACPT looks forward to hosting more professional workshops and social events in Western Canada, so stay tuned for upcoming events on the CACPT website.

Highlights of the New ArcGIS 10.5 Release

In December, ArcGIS 10.5 will be released. We wanted to make you aware of some of the key highlights of this release.

ArcGIS for Server Renamed to ArcGIS Enterprise

ArcGIS Enterprise represents the evolution of our GIS server technology into a complete GIS platform in your own infrastructure, supporting enterprises of any size. It provides a full web GIS experience integrated with ArcGIS Online and ArcGIS Desktop. ArcGIS Server is not going away: it simply becomes one of the fundamental components of ArcGIS Enterprise with the 10.5 release.

New Capabilities in ArcGIS Enterprise

The base ArcGIS Enterprise deployment provides foundational web GIS capabilities such as the ability to publish map and feature services, web mapping capabilities, story map templates, Web AppBuilder and lots of apps. In addition to this strong core set of functionality, you can expand the capabilities of ArcGIS Enterprise through additional ArcGIS Server roles.

New server roles include the highly anticipated ArcGIS GeoAnalytics Server that provides fast batch analysis of geospatial big data, ArcGIS GeoEvent Server (formerly GeoEvent Extension), ArcGIS Image Server (formerly Image Extension) and ArcGIS Business Analyst Server.

Past President and Lifetime Member, Tom Villella and our Executive Director, George T. Zajac, attended their classes last year to begin the monitoring process. The whole Accreditation process should take approximately two years.

The CACPT Code of Ethics

For new members and as a gentle reminder, below is our Code of Ethics as a Certified Planning Technician. Please read and remember to practice them, as well as conduct ourselves in a responsible manner and not discredit other members or the Association.

Canadian Association of Certified Planning Technicians Code of Ethics

The Code of Ethics of the Association is as follows:

THE CERTIFIED PLANNING TECHNICIAN RECOGNIZES THE PRECEPTS OF PERSONAL INTEGRITY AND PROFESSIONAL COMPETENCE AS FUNDAMENTAL ETHICS, AND AS SUCH HE/SHE:

SHALL have proper regard for the physical environment and the safety, health and well-being of the public;

SHALL always conduct himself/herself in a responsible manner and utilize fair and equitable business practices in dealing with his/her colleagues, clients, and associates;

SHALL undertake only those assignments for which he/she is competent by virtue of his/her training and experience, and where warranted, engage or advise the engagement of such specialists as are required to enable him/her to properly complete assignments;

SHALL protect to the fullest extend possible, consistent with the well-being of the public, any information given him/her in confidence by an employer, colleague or member of the public;

SHALL refrain from making unjustified statements or from performing unethical acts which would discredit the Association or any of its members;

SHALL indicate to his/her employer or client any adverse consequences which may result from an over-ruling of his/her technicaljudgement by a non-technical authority;

SHALL avoid any connection with such advertising which implicitly or explicitly demeans the competence of other members of the Association;

SHALL strive to maintain his/her proficiency by updating his/her technical knowledge and skills as required to properly practice planning technology;

SHALL uphold the provisions of the Code of Ethics, and without fear or any favour report in the proper manner unethical or incompetent conduct of any other member to the President of the Association
